What is the PE and Sports Premium Funding?

The government has provided funding of £320 million per annum for academic years 2013-2023 to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport and will see money going directly to primary school head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children.

The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

Purpose of funding

Schools have to spend the sport funding on improving provision of PE and sport but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

The vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium: **ALL** pupils leaving primary school **physically literate** and with the **knowledge, skills and motivation** necessary to equip them for a **healthy, active lifestyle** and **lifelong participation** in physical activity and sport

The funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following **OBJECTIVE**: To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

Key Indicator 1: the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity - the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school

Key Indicator 2: the profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement

Key Indicator 3: increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport

Key Indicator 4: broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils

Key Indicator 5: increased participation in competitive sport

Due to space constraints, there are times with EYFS PE will take place on their playground and the addition of these markings means children have the opportunity to learn how to follow a fitness trail in their PE lessons which can then be accessed at break and lunchtimes to encourage active breaks and lunches.</p> <p>Additional high quality CPD for PE teaching staff from ASM delivered within PE lessons to ensure the teaching of PE is of the highest standard. <p>Key Indicator 2</p>	<p>£0 Staffordshire County Cricket</p> <p>£14,608 Long Jump Pit</p>	<p>club was hugely popular and the pupils in the club explained that they 'enjoyed' the club and 'never done this before'.</p> <p>The profile of health and PE is raised through assemblies, enrichment day, extra-curricular activities, varied and engaging PE lessons, a range of opportunities throughout the year and regularly signposting to community links and staff, pupils, parents and the wider school community recognise the value it has and the role it can play in whole school improvements.</p> <p>Pupils feedback on their enjoyment and engagement in lessons and this continues to grow so that all pupils have positive experiences, improved self-esteem, knowledge of the importance of being active and staying healthy and a love of PE.</p> <p>For the third continuous year, Staffordshire County Cricket have delivered CPD to KS2 teaching staff while training our KS2 pupils in a cricket programme. This has been followed up with a weekly club to encourage more pupils to learn how to play cricket and hopefully join a team outside of school. The club has ran for a whole term and the sessions have been rewarding (feedback from staff and pupils).</p> <p>We have installed a long jump to allow pupils to train and learn how to long jump so they can compete in the Northwood Athletic Event.</p>	<p>two full terms instead of swapping each half term like usual.</p> <p>ASM's boxercise club has introduced pupils to a sport they may never have otherwise encountered. Most reported that they had really enjoyed it and encouraged them to be more active than they would normally. This support the promotion of a love of being active and hopefully enable them with more confidence and a positive attitude to try new sports.</p> <p>Staff are trained to a high level in the delivery of cricket. Action Plan / Next Steps 2024 / 2025

- Staff training and development for new staffing joining the school
- Increase attendance to competitions – clearly set out competition calendar at the start of the year to ensure most entries
- Increase links with local clubs – make contact to ask to offer taster sessions and support with promotion
- More opportunities to inspire the children to take up sport and lead an active lifestyle
- Improve quality of the gymnastics provision – look at replacement of current wooden equipment
